Community of Organisms

com•mu•ni•ty n A group of organisms of different species that co-occur in the same habitat.

The Community Learning Garden replaces a monoculture of grass with many plant species that support countless organisms.

Butterflies: Plants in the garden provide food for caterpillars, nectar for adults and shelter. Butterflies can land on rocks in the puddles to drink.

Biodiversity: Look for insects and other animals that wouldn't be here without the garden.

Water Reclamation: Stormwater runoff is a leading source of pollution in lakes and rivers. The deep root systems of native plants use and retain more water than lawn grass.

Community of Learners

This Community Learning Garden brings neighbors and the community together around conservation and nature.

Understand: The Community Learning Garden enhances people's understanding of the relationships between organisms and their environment.

Discover: Citizen scientists can collect data and contribute to scientific studies in the garden.

Appreciate: A garden holds aesthetic beauty not found in a grass lawn, giving neighbors a place to walk, sit or observe nature.
